

### Message from Woking Borough Council on developments within the Cemetery

In the last newsletter it was wrongly stated that Woking Borough Council was the major shareholder.

The following report is from Mr. Ian Tombes, Strategic Asset Manager -Woking Borough Council who explains the ownership and the many exciting developments within the Cemetery.

"Woking Borough Council the ultimate shareholder of the site but through their ThamesWey group of companies and have set up a new "Woking Necropolis company and Mausoleum Ltd" to whom they have given a loan. WNML will operate the site with Diane and Kevin retained as employees. the ultimate Ι am shareholders representative.

On trees we surveyed all the trees. A undertaking. Of huge the thousands of trees, 240 have been identified as needing urgent work and 85 per cent of these need felling. In the context of all the trees on this site this is a relatively small number.

I have commissioned Surrey Wildlife Trust to undertake a complete ecological survey of the site which will last from now until October. This information will inform the overall management plan for the site.

I successfully bid and obtained £100,000 from English Heritage towards the cost of producing a complete management plan for the site which will take into account heritage, ecology, operational needs etc. This piece of work will be tendered over

the next couple of months and will likely take the rest of the year to complete.

On other matters we will shortly be tendering for works to the Italian Mausoleums to rectify roof drainage issues and we have just purchased £12k of grave shoring equipment to enable new graves to be dug and exhumations to be undertaken safely. Other additional new equipment is planned for the site including a new tractor and trailer which are also on order.

All historic plans and documents have now been catalogued by the Surrey History Centre and either reside there or at the cemetery archive."

## MAYORAL VISITS TO BROOKWOOD CEMETERY

... so much to see and so little time ......

During a 28 days period this Spring we had no less than three Mayoral visits to the cemetery. In early February it was a great pleasure to welcome the Mayor and Mayoress of Woking and to be able to show them a little of both sides of the Cemetery. With prior arrangement I was able to show them the Stonemasons Yard complex - with its original railway lines and turntable. Dr. Gottilieb Leitner (plot 2) was our first port of call and press photos were taken although sadly no editorial regarding Leitner's influence on the development of Woking itself was included. Margaret Hobbs and Ed guided the party round the North section, including details of our unique railway network within the cemetery. The afternoon concluded with tea and

Later in February the Mayor of Runnymede paid a brief visit to the St Edward Brotherhood and I joined them - for more tea and cakes - and a visit to the Monk's church. I was able to tell the Mayor a little about the Cemetery's history, the railway (the Monks have a piece of track in their reception room) and details of a few of our more interesting graves and memorials. The Mayor hopes to return later in the year for a more in depth tour.

The Mayoral visit 'hat trick' was requested through the Woking Town Twinning Association. The Mayor and Mayoress of Rastatt (South West Germany) and his party were shown the South side of the Cemetery, culminating in a visit to the Commonwealth War Graves. Again Dr. Leitner featured as did Eph Thompson the African American elephant trainer. Sadly time was limited so I was not able to take them to the North side. 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## Franz Arthur Frederick Schuster (Sir Arthur Schuster) FRS Physicist (1851-1934) Plot 56



The eminent mathematical physicist, Franz Arthur Frederick Schuster (Sir Arthur Schuster), was born on the 12th September 1851 in Frankfurt, Germany, the second son of Franz Joseph (1824 - 1906) and Marie Schuster Pfieffer (1831-1890). His father had a textile and banking business, Schuster Son & Co, and the family moved from Germany to Lancashire in 1870; at this time Arthur was studying in Geneva, but joined his family that year in England. The family was originally of the Jewish faith but converted to Christianity. It is probable that they settled in Manchester, because at this time the city was the international heart of the booming cotton and textile trade.

Sir Arthur had an older brother, Ernest Joseph (1850-1924), who was a barrister, and a younger brother, Felix Otto (1854-1936), who was a banker and barrister; he also had a younger sister, Marie Adele Henrietta Paula, known as Paula (1863-?). Sir Arthur subsequently, like all the family, became a naturalised British subject in 1875.

#### Family Life and Career

When the family moved to England in 1870 thev lived in Chorlton on Medlock. For the following year the Lancashire. census gives Franz Joseph's occupation as a merchant, as were Ernest and Arthur. After working in the family business for about a year, Arthur went to study at Owens College (later Manchester University), Manchester. he studied pure mathematics under Professor Thomas Barker and physics under Professor Balfour Stewart, and began research with Sir Henry Roscoe on the spectra of hydrogen and nitrogen. Then he spent a year working under the physicist Gustav Kirchhoff at the University Heidelberg. Here he gained his PhD and returned to Manchester, where he worked for a while in the unpaid position of a In 1875 he returned to demonstrator. Germany and worked on spectrum analysis with the famous scientists Wilhelm Eduard Weber and Hermann von Helmholtz. In 1876 he visited Thailand in order to photograph the coronal spectrum of the total eclipse of the sun. There were further expeditions in 1878, 1882 and 1886.

On his return to England in 1876, Arthur worked for five years at the Cavendish Laboratory, Cambridge University, with James Clerk-Maxwell F.R.S., F.R.S.E. and John W Strutt, (3<sup>rd</sup> Baron Rayleigh); they were working on the determination of the ohm in absolute measure. Arthur was made a Fellow of the Royal Society in 1879 and in 1881 and he was appointed to the Beyer Chair of Mathematics at Own College, Manchester.

In July 1887 at Banbury, Oxfordshire, Arthur married Emma Caroline Elizabeth Loveday, known as Cary (1867-1962). The couple resided in Chorlton on Medlock and had five children: Leonard Francis (1889 - 1985), followed by twins Margaret (1891 - 1956) who married the well known metallurgist Robert Salmon Hutton, and Sibyl Marie (1891 - ?). Then came Norah

Henriette (1892 -?) and lastly Florence Caroline (1893-1978).

In 1888, the year after his marriage, Arthur took up the position of Langworthy Professor of Physics at Manchester University. He held this post until 1907 when he retired, partly due to ill health and partly to promote the cause of science worldwide. He was knighted in 1920 and held various positions with the Royal Society: as Secretary (1912 -1919) and as Vice-President (1919 -1924). He was also Secretary to the International Research Council (1919 -1928) and President of the British Association in 1915.

During his time as Professor of Physics at Manchester University, Arthur set up a large busy teaching and research laboratory. By 1900 a new laboratory was opened in Coupland Street of his design. He was instrumental in the setting up, three separate universities, Manchester, Liverpool and Leeds, from out the old Victorian University in Manchester

He is best noted for his work on antimatter, spectroscopy, optics, magnetism and the mathematical theory of periodicity.

His published works include: An Intermediate Course of Practical Physics (1896), An Introduction to the Theory of Optics (1904), Britain's Heritage of Science (1917). He published his autobiography as "Biographical Fragments" in 1932.

Sir Arthur held doctorates from Oxford, Cambridge, Manchester, St Andrews, Heidelberg and Geneva Universities. His family's business success allowed them to endowed readerships in mathematical physics at Cambridge and Manchester Universities.

Sometime between 1911 and 1914, Arthur and Cary moved to Wargrave, Berkshire, and it was from here that his daughter Margaret married in 1914.

There was some anti German feeling towards the family during WWI, but this was overcome when it was known that his son, Leonard, had been wounded while serving with the armed forces in 1915.

He died on October 14<sup>th</sup> 1934 at Yeldall, Wargrave, Berkshire and his flat memorial of Roman stone includes his portrait. His wife Cary died on April 12<sup>th</sup> 1962 and is interred with her husband.

### CHARLES BRADLAUGH 1833-1891 PLOT 198 (North Side)

Fellow Committee member Gail Naughton and I thought it was high time the Charles Bradlaugh grave was cleared and the memorial, kerbing and chaining was revealed. Sadly the original bronze bust of Bradlaugh and the leaf decoration were stolen in 1938, and since then the yew hedging has been allowed to grow up all around, concealing the memorial. In early February, with permission from the Cemetery office we started the task. At the time of writing work has stopped as the robins are nesting in what is left of the hedging, but we plan to continue in a month or two.

<u>Charles Bradlaugh</u> – atheist, freethinker, supporter of birth control and reformer was very much controversial character. He was Liberal M.P. for Northampton for 11 years – but could not take his seat in the House until 1886 when he was permitted by the then Speaker, to 'affirm' rather than 'swear' the Oath.

David Lloyd George, Annie Besant (women's rights activist) together with a large proportion of the then Indian population of London attended his big funeral – among them the young Gandi. The service was what we call now a humanist funeral.

## VICTORIA CROSS GRAVES RESTORED



During the week starting the 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2015 members of the VC Trust worked at Brookwood Cemetery civilian sections cleaning and tidying the eleven VC graves.

The VC Trust based in Doncaster, is a charity totally funded by donations, and works tirelessly to ensure the memory and graves of every VC recipient are remembered and maintained.

At Brookwood Several VC graves were cleared of foliage by members of the society prior to and during the Trust's visit, to help with the restoration. The VC Trust used specialized steaming equipment which gently cleans the stonework. Any broken cement from the centre of graves was removed as were weeds and grass and replaced with new shingle.

On Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> March 2015 the VC Trust held an Open Day and many dignitaries attended, including Lord Ashcroft, the Mayor and Mayoress of Woking and members of Woking Borough Council, plus interested members of the Public.

During the morning a service was held to rededicate the graves, by two military padres, Gary and Charles, the last post was played followed by a two minute silence, then Reveille. The padres then went on to each separate grave to bless the head stone.

Along with the service a new book on VC heroes was available as well as one on George Cross recipients and a book on one of our own VC's John Sherwood-Kelly. Refreshments were also readily available, and all in all the day and the week were a great success.




